PRESENTATIONS

2014 Digital Counties Survey Winners

The Board of Supervisors presented Phillip Martin, Information Technology Director, with the 2014 Digital Counties Survey award to Montgomery County for placing in the top 10 among counties with population up to 150,000. This award reflects the efforts of IT and County departments in modernizing technology to provide greater efficiency, and more on-line business functions and information.

Montgomery County Annual Report

The Montgomery County Annual Report video was presented by the Public Information Officer. The video outlined the accomplishments of the County for FY 2013-2014.

The Chair thanked the Public Information staff consisting of Ruth Richey, Chris Coleman and Josh Rosenfield for all their hard work in putting the Annual Report Video together.

DELEGATIONS

Virginia Department of Transportation

David Clarke, VDOT Residency Administrator, updated the Board on the following roads/projects:

- Summer Maintenance projects are underway with mowing and summer paving.
- Blue Springs Road a Revenue Sharing project is still underway. The project should be complete by the end of the summer.
- Major pipe replacements on several roads in Pilot and Elliston.
- Mt. Tabor Road and Lick Run Road have had drainage issues. VDOT is repairing the culverts along these roads. VDOT will have to close a portion of Lick Run Road in order to do the repairs.
- Laurel Ridge Road – sections of this road were patched due to some settlement of the road. No pipe replacement was needed.
- Fairview Church Road will need to have pipes replaced in order to relieve flooding.
- On September 23, 2014 at 5:00 p.m. at the Christiansburg High School, VDOT will hold an information meeting on the I-81 Exit 105 Bridge replacement project.

Board of Supervisors comments/questions:

Supervisor Perkins received a call from a citizen about the entrance onto US 460 Business leaving Heritage Hall. Apparently there is lack of signage stating this is a one-way road and several people have turned left instead of right. She asked if signs could be installed alerting motorists of right turn only.

Supervisor Perkins also stated that residents along Clay Street would like to have yellow striping painted on the road in order to see the road better at night.

Supervisor Creed asked for an update on Mt. Pleasant Road. Mr. Clarke replied that VDOT is currently working on the revenue sharing project and obtaining the needed right-of-way before the construction can move forward.

Supervisor Biggs asked if there has been any progress with the issues on the Forest Service Road where the entrance is in need of maintenance. Mr. Clarke stated that VDOT cannot do anything as the road is maintained by the U.S. Forest Service. The right-of-way belongs to VDOT; however, like with any other road, VDOT does not maintain the right-of-way within a private road. Mr. Clarke stated that the U.S. Forest Service has always maintained this right-of-way.

The Chair thanked Mr. Clarke for attending the Board meeting.

PUBLIC HEARING

The following public hearing was advertised pursuant to law in the “NEW RIVER VALLEY” Section of the Roanoke Times on August 24, 2014 and August 31, 2014:

Vacation of a Lot Line and Public Utility Easement – Blacksburg Country Club Subdivision – David and Edith Duncan

A request by David Paul & Edith Anne Pendergraft Duncan (Agent: Neil Martin, Anderson & Associates, Inc) to vacate a lot line and a public utility easement between lots 411 and 412 located in Blacksburg Country Club subdivision recorded in plat book 5, page 19 in the Montgomery County Circuit Court Clerk’s office, as shown more particularly on the Plat dated July 22, 2014, prepared by Anderson & Associates, Inc. and entitled “Plat of Boundary Line Vacation for Tax Parcels 55-10-411 & 412 and 29-5-72”. The property is located on Plank Drive approximately 0.25 miles to the east of the Lusters Gate Road intersection and is identified as Tax Parcel Nos. 55-10-411 and 55-10-412 (Acct Nos. 003024, 017805) in the Mount Tabor Magisterial District (District A). The property currently lies in an area designated as Residential Transition in the 2025 Comprehensive Plan.

Brea Hopkins, Development Planner, provided a summary on the above request. The County received a request from David and Edith Duncan to vacate a 15 ft. public utility easement measuring approximately 181 feet in length and to vacate the property line between two parcels located in the Blacksburg Country Club subdivision. The property owner desires to create one larger lot instead of two smaller lots. The property was surveyed and certified that no known utilities are located in the existing easement.

The County Attorney reported that according to the State Code that vacation of any public utility easements after lots in a subdivision have been sold must be approved by the local governing body by ordinance.

The public hearing was open for citizen comments.

There being no speakers, the public hearing was closed.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Marty Gordon addressed the Board on a couple of issues. He commended VDOT on a nice job of paving Merrimac Road; however, this has created an issue with speeding. Mr. Gordon stated that a petition for a speed study to lower the speed on Merrimac Road will be forthcoming. He stated numerous cyclists use Merrimac Road and there have been several accidents on the road. A request for additional signage, "Share the Road", has been submitted to VDOT to alert motorists of cyclists on the road.

Mr. Gordon also commented on the efforts to save the eagle statue in front of the old courthouse. In his investigating who the sculptor of the eagle statue is he has found another statue located at Roanoke College and maybe a third statue in Lynchburg, Virginia. He was told by Roanoke College that if it is the same sculptor then the name would be located at the base of the statue. Mr. Gordon asked permission to either allow him or county staff to examine the base of the eagle statue to determine if there is a signature of the artist located on the base.

There being no further speakers, the public address session was closed.

WHEREAS, The **2014 Fire Prevention Week** theme “*Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month*” effectively serves to remind us that we need working smoke alarms to give us the time to safely escape a burning building.

FY 2014 Year- End Report

Marc Magruder, Budget Manager, made a presentation on Montgomery County's FY 2014 Year-End as follows:

FY 14 REVENUE HIGHLIGHTS

- Revenue collections (excluding grants which are not estimated in the annual budget) exceeded the estimates by \$203,329 making collections within 100.19% of the estimates.
- Grant funds are not estimated within the original budget due to the uncertainty of collections due to timing issues, variation in fiscal years, etc.
- Designated General Fund revenues were less than the estimates by (\$.7) due largely to the Comprehensive Services Act. State funding for this program is based on a reimbursement of expenditures. When costs are less, the reimbursement is also less.

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FY14 REVENUE HIGHLIGHTS


- Total undesignated revenue collections exceeded the estimates by nearly \$1 million which is less than 1% of total estimate.
- Unexpected revenue sources including the sale of real estate, increase in prepaid taxes, recovered costs and other miscellaneous collections contributed to this increase.
- Personal property taxes; however, experienced a decrease due to a significantly lower motor vehicle valuation resulting in a shortfall of nearly \$1 million in collections.
- This shortfall was offset by increased collections in RE, Merchants Capital, Business Furniture and Fixtures (BFF) and Public Service Corporation taxes.

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REVENUE PICTURE GOING FORWARD


- The County is in the process of projecting revenues for the FY 16 budget.
- These estimates will be evaluated and refined through the County's December collections.
- Preliminary revenue projections for FY 16 will be provided in January of 2015.
- Final revenue projections will be presented with the FY 16 Budget in March of 2015.

COUNTY REQUESTS

- To date, County departments have not been given the opportunity to submit carry forward requests.
- Traditionally the County has provided \$500,000 in matching revenue sharing funds for road projects. If matching funds are provided each year, this cost should be included in the annual operating budget.
- Staff and associated costs for the upcoming Board of Equalization will require funds. This cost occurs once every four years.
- Since County employees did not receive a salary increase, it was planned that if funds remained at year end, a one-time pay supplement would be provided. The cost of a 1.5%- 2% one-time payment is estimated to be between \$295,000-\$393,000.

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School Board Request to Carryover FY 14 Unencumbered Funds

The County Administrator reported the School Board submitted a letter of request to the Board of Supervisors requesting the Board to consider an appropriation of FY 14 Year-End School funds totaling \$1,779,337.

Brenda Blackburn, MCPS Superintendent, provide additional remarks. Ms. Blackburn stated while the State continues to decrease education funds, the County has stepped forward providing additional funding to support education. The County provided capital funds to complete three construction projects: a new Blacksburg High School; a new Auburn High School; and a renovated Auburn High School for the Auburn Middle School. She expressed her appreciation of the Board of Supervisors supporting the school system. Ms. Blackburn outlined the use of the carryforward funds as follows:

Planned Expenditures for Unencumbered Carryover Funds

- Restore federal funding support at a total cost of \$324,958. These funds will be reallocated to the special education and Title I budgets to provide support for the special needs and Title I population.
- Offset the remaining portion of the total cost of an ITRT (\$63,800) by \$8,660 with carryover funds.
- Restore Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) participation in *Governor's School Summer Program* at a cost of \$7,434. The summer program enhances the regular year *Governor's School* program by providing in-depth enrichment for a specific subject area during the summer. By restoring this program, MCPS will be able to provide a secondary school enrichment program option for the students. This is the second year carryover funds have been used to cover the *Governor's School Summer Program*.

- Implement the eLearning Backpack Initiative at the four high schools at a total cost of \$328,984. This is a 1 to 1 tablet initiative for 9th grade students. This cost includes the required district match for the eLearning Backpack Grant for CHS, AHS, and EMHS at a cost of \$41,600; additional cost to fund eLearning Backpack Grant for CHS, AHS, and EMHS \$89,694. An additional \$208,000 in state grant funds will be awarded for these three high schools to support the eLearning Backpack Initiative. District funds will *cover* the entire cost of \$197,690 to provide the eLearning Backpack program for BHS.
- Additional Capital Maintenance Projects at a total cost of \$575,000, to be identified by the School Board using the priority listing from the Cardno TEC report and the capital maintenance project list.
- Restore Pre-K funding loss from state support at a total cost of \$35,010.
- During the 2013-2014 school year, Eastern Montgomery High School was selected as one of approximately 32 schools in the Commonwealth to participate in American College Application Campaign. The program focuses on increasing the number of first-generation and low-income students who pursue a post-secondary education with a purpose of helping high school seniors navigate the college admissions process and ensure each participating student submits at least one admissions application. MCPS will enhance our current efforts to get students focused on post-secondary opportunities by integrating ideas from the Campaign at EMHS at every high school in 2014-2015 at a total cost of \$50,000.
- Restore Field Trip Budget at a total cost of \$32,116, which were cut from the original budget.
- Purchase Web Content Management Software that supports enhanced website and the parent/student online registration process at a total cost of \$30,935.
- Provide 1 year only contracts for 2 reserve teacher units to address class size issues which may occur since 11 FTE were reduced this year at a total cost of \$127,600.
- Add an additional Social Worker for \$63,800 to better support district needs.
- Provide training for Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) at a cost of \$1,800. PBIS is a systematic approach to school-wide behavior based on a response to intervention model. The PBIS model has been successfully implemented in thousands of schools in over 40 states, resulting in dramatic reductions in disciplinary issues and a corresponding increase in academic achievement.

School Board Request for Funds for Capital Needs

The County Administrator reported the School Board submitted the following request for funding for School Capital Needs:

The purpose of the requested \$575,000 from Montgomery County is to be used for capital improvements for Montgomery County Schools. The Board of Supervisors has recognized the importance of funds for school district capital expenses through a one-time allocation of \$400,000 in 2013 and special allocations in the past 2 school years of \$250,000 for roof replacement projects; \$150,000 for technology; and \$175,000 for bus replacement. These items were a part of the original School Board budget request for 2015 but, due to the gap between identified needs and available funding, they were not funded in the final budget approved by the School Board on May 19, 2014. They remain critical items for funding from other sources.

The following is additional information offered regarding the request:

Provide a Building Capital Repair/Improvement Budget Line Item

The \$250,000 request is a budget line to continue roof replacement and repair projects per plans approved by the School Board. If approved by the Board of Supervisors, funds may be appropriated to the School Board budget or remain in a capital account maintained by the County Administration.

Technology Improvement Plan Budget Line Item

In order to continue the improvement plan \$150,000 is requested to support continued improvements in hardware. The Schools have over 5,000 computers and associated technology valued over \$6 million. The future of instruction is tied to teacher and student access to and use of current technology. With a three to five year life cycle, it is critical that technology is maintained, updated, and replaced.

Replacement of Aging School Buses

With a fleet of 125 buses and State guidelines for the use of a bus for ten years on daily routes plus two years as a spare, the school division should replace 10 to 11 buses per year. During the 5 year period from 2010 - 2014 fifteen buses have been purchased, an average of 3 per year.

Approval by the Board of Supervisors provides an additional \$575,000 available to MCPS for designated capital needs (roofing project), technology purchases for teacher and student use, and the purchase of 2 school buses. Support by the Board of Supervisors for these specific capital needs will allow the School Board greater flexibility to address other needs of the school division with carryover funds.

Brenda Blackburn, MCPS Superintendent, provided additional information to their request. She stated that the Schools have numerous capital and maintenance needs and only are able to complete a few projects a year from the additional funding the Board of Supervisors has allocated in the past. They hope to repair the roofs at Shawsville Middle School, Gilbert Linkous Elementary School, Falling Brach Elementary School Gym, and the Christiansburg High School Football Concession Building. The Schools are also looking at completing several projects from the Cardno Tech study.

VDOT Revenue Sharing Program FY 16

The County Administrator reported that VDOT has sent out the application packet for the FY 16 Revenue Sharing Program. The deadline to submit an application is October 31, 2014.

Traditionally, the County allocates \$500,000 in county funds to be matched by VDOT totaling \$1 million in funds.

The County Administrator asked if the Board would like to continue to participate in the Revenue Sharing Program. If so, how much money would the Board like to allocate and what road projects would they like to submit. He did comment that there is interest in applying for revenue sharing funds to upgrade Prices Fork Road from McCoy Road to Brookfield Road. The project would consist of constructing an additional lane with a turn lane. This project is estimated at \$1.8 million. This project will also benefit the development of the former Prices Fork Elementary School. The County Administrator also mentioned that Lynn Nystrom contacted the County about improving Sugar Grove Road with revenue sharing funds.

Supervisor Creed reported that he would like to include Boners Run Road. He believes VDOT is spending more money in maintenance for this road over the years than it would cost to upgrade. He stated he is in favor of allocating funds to participate in VDOT's Revenue Sharing Program.

Supervisor Tuck asked if the County could obtain traffic counts on roads that the County would like to include on the priority list. This way they can get a better idea on how many residents would benefit from having their road upgraded. He also asked how will residents who live in the Prices Fork Road area like having a three lane road.

The Board discussed past allocations in each district and a few Board members suggested that districts that have not received revenue sharing funding in the past several years be considered for funding in FY 16.

The Board agreed to submit an application for revenue sharing funds for FY 16 and instructed staff to prepare a list of road projects for consideration at the next meeting. Board members also requested a traffic count for the each road recommended.

School Board – Disposition of Associated Properties adjoining Shawsville Middle School

The County Administrator reported that the School Board adopted a resolution on August 5, 2014 declaring its intention for the disposition of associated property to the Shawsville Middle School as follows:

Resolution of the Montgomery County School Board Declaring its Intention for the
Disposition of Associated Property to Shawsville Middle School
Located at, Shawsville, Virginia 24162

August 5, 2014

Whereas, the Montgomery County School Board is the owner of certain real property and improvements thereto located at 4179 Old Town Road, Shawsville, VA 24162, which property is commonly referred to as "Football Stadium/Press Box, Baseball Field, Tennis Court Concession Stand, Athletic Storage, Ticket Booth, Scoreboard, Bleachers, and Lights," (the "Property"), and is responsible for the use of the Property to meet the educational needs of Montgomery County Public Schools; and Whereas, the property is not currently being used for educational space and

the Montgomery County School Board does not have an on-going, but rather, a periodic need for the Property (i.e. ball fields) ; and

Whereas, the Montgomery County School Board desires to cooperate in the mutual interests of economic development that benefits the Schools and Montgomery County.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Montgomery County School Board that:

1. The Montgomery County School Board declares that the Property is surplus to the needs of the Montgomery County Public Schools, as authorized by Virginia Code Section 22.1-129.
2. The Montgomery County School Board resolves that the property be turned over to Montgomery County to manage and provide for use by the Shawsville community.
3. That the Montgomery County School Board desires to convey the title to the Property to the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors with the understanding that the Board of Supervisors make available to the Montgomery County School Board to use as needed for educational purposes.
4. That the Montgomery County School Board directs its Chairman or the Superintendent to sign all documents necessary to the proper conveyance of the Property to the Montgomery County Board of Supervisors, which have been approved by the School Board's legal counsel and to arrange to have such documents recorded in the Clerk's Office of the Montgomery County Circuit Court.

The County Administrator reported that the School Board is going to demolish the old building located on the property as planned; however, there has been community interest in keeping the athletic fields and associated property intact for community use.

Chair Brown reported that Mountain Valley Charitable Foundation (MVCF) has submitted a letter outlining their interest in utilizing this property for the benefit of eastern Montgomery County if the Board of Supervisor accepts the property from the School Board. MVCF has stated that the track is used daily and the Ruritan Club uses the grounds for its annual Independence Day celebration. MVCF proposes the following:

1. The Foundation would lease the property for a period of 5 years for \$1 per year.
2. The County would do the mowing and the Foundation would do upkeep and maintenance of the property.
3. The Foundation would make the property available to the County and the schools for education and recreation.
4. The Foundation will coordinate and oversee the uses of the property.
5. After five years the Foundation will have the option to renew for 30 years

Brenda Blackburn, MCPS Superintendent, offered additional information. Ms. Blackburn reported that all school athletic activities take place at other school locations. It was the School's intention to demolish all structures on the site, which included the football bleachers, lights, concession stand and others as listed on their resolution. They were not going to demolish the track, tennis court, and baseball field. However, due to the concern of a member of the Board of Supervisors and community concern, they only demolished the old annex structure. The School Board is not going to spend money to make remaining structures safe for continuing use.

Mike Hawes, Mountain Valley Charitable Foundation, provided an explanation to their proposal and answered questions by the Board.

After a lengthy discussion, the Board of Supervisors agreed to consider accepting the associated property located at the Shawsville Middle School. They instructed staff to contact Mountain Valley Charitable Foundation to work out the details of an agreement to lease the property if the Board does accept the property from the School Board.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

The County Administrator reported on the following items:

- Park and Ride Lot: VDOT will hold a public hearing on October 30, 2014 at the Falling Branch Elementary School on their proposal for a permanent park and ride lot. VDOT is

proposing to expand the temporary lot to permanent lot with 300 parking spaces on a 5 acre lot. There will be sidewalks, bike racks, lights and a bus shelter. There has been some interest in the possible location of a Welcome Center at this site.

- Recognized the Deputy County Administrator, Carol Edmonds, who oversees the County's Information Technology Department. He commended her and the IT Department on winning the 2014 Digital County award.
- Mountain Valley Pipeline – The County Administrator reported that he received a call about letters sent to property owners from Mountain Valley Pipeline requesting permission to survey their property. The letters were sent to property owners in different areas so it seems that there may be 3-4 alternate routes.

BOARD MEMBERS REPORTS

Supervisor King invited all Board members to visit their area volunteer Fire Departments.

Supervisor Perkins attended the Roanoke Valley Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (RVAMPO) meeting. The RVAMPO discussed the possibility of changing their name to the Roanoke Valley Transportation Planning Organization. They believe the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) name does not directly communicate the transportation planning focus and role of the MPO to the public at large.

RVAMPO is proposing the MPO Policy Board establish a \$0.15 per capita MPO dues structure, which would only be assessed on the portion of a locality's population within the MPO service area. The non-urbanized areas of participating MPO communities would not be assessed these MPO dues. These funds will assist the Roanoke Valley Area Metropolitan Planning Organization to meet the required local cash match for the Federal Planning Grant funds that the Roanoke Valley-Alleghany Regional Commission is currently using to pay for the MPO work. Currently, the Regional Commission receives \$469,209 in federal and state transportation planning funds with a required cash match of \$52,134. Montgomery County's share would be \$210.00.

Supervisor Perkins also reported the RVAMPO discussing the Commonwealth Transportation Board development of a Transportation Prioritization Process for planning and selecting transportation projects as part of the Governor's plan to improve the Six-Year Improvement Plan for Primary and Interstate Roads.

- Governor McAuliffe signed House Bill 2 (HB2) into law in 2014, which directs the CTB to develop and use a prioritization process to select the right transportation projects.
- The legislation is intended to improve the transparency and accountability of project selection as well as provide improved stability in the Six-Year Improvement Program.
- The process will score projects based on an objective and fair analysis that is applied statewide. This process will help the CTB to select projects that provide the maximum benefits for tax dollars spent.
- As required by law under HB2, the CTB will develop the prioritization process using an open and transparent process.

- The Board will solicit candidate projects from local communities. Candidate projects will be screened to determine whether they meet a need identified in VTrans 2040 – the long-range transportation plan. If a project meets a need it will be evaluated and scored using the prioritization process.
- Once the projects are scored through the prioritization process, the CTB will then have the information it needs to make the best decisions on which projects to fund.

The CTB will solicit input from localities, metropolitan planning organizations, transit authorities, transportation authorities, and other stakeholders in the development of the project prioritization process.

Supervisor Biggs thanked the County’s General Services Department for taking care of the exposed roots at the Meadowbrook Library in Shawsville.

The Library Board has finalized the Library’s FY 2016-2017 Capital Plan, which includes a new Blacksburg Library and renovation to the Christiansburg Library. Supervisor Biggs stated that the library system has numerous capital needs also.

Supervisor Tuck commented that it has been eight years since Montgomery County Sheriff’s Department Corporal Eric Sutphin was murdered. In 2010 the Eric Sutphin Memorial Scholarship Fund for Children of Law Enforcement, overseen by the Community Foundation of the NRV, was established in his honor.

Supervisor Gabriele asked if potential dates for the County’s Community Conversation meetings have been established. The County Administrator stated they are working on a few possible dates.

Supervisor Gabriele also requested an update on his suggestion that a capital needs study be done for the County’s Park and Recreation Department and the Library.
