PRESENTATIONS

Finance Department – Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting

The Board of Supervisors presented Angie Hill, Financial Management & Services Director with a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting by the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) for the County's comprehensive annual financial report.

The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting. This is Montgomery County's 27th Award.

Virginia Department of Transportation

David Clarke, VDOT, provided an update on road projects/issues in Montgomery County as follows:

- Brush Creek Road FY 2014 Revenue Sharing project is complete.
- Yellow Sulphur Road Project- .2 mile section will be paved from the bridge to the Jennell Road intersection and is scheduled to begin in the Fall 2015.
- Sydney Church Road Project is in the design stage.
- Piney Woods Road Project is under construction. The project includes two miles of paving @\$2.5 million and is scheduled for completion in August 2016.
- The Ironto-Ellistion connector –North Fork Road (SR 603) remains on schedule.
- Regular on-going maintenance.

Supervisor Tuck expressed his appreciation to VDOT for scraping and smoothing out Old Sourwood Road.

PUBLIC HEARING

Boundary Line Adjustment Agreement – Town of Christiansburg
County's intent to approve a proposed Boundary Line Adjustment Agreement between the County of Montgomery and the Town of Christiansburg and will thereafter consider for passage a resolution approving the Agreement.

The Agreement is authorized by Section 15.2-3106 et seq. of the Code of Virginia, 1950, as amended, and provides that the boundary line between the Town of Christiansburg and the unincorporated area of the County of Montgomery will be changed by moving 12.117 acres from the incorporated Town of Christiansburg boundary into the unincorporated area of the County of Montgomery. The proposed boundary adjustment area is located on the northeast boundary of the Town of Christiansburg and the unincorporated area of the County of Montgomery adjacent to Cinnabar Road and the U.S. Route 460 By-Pass, shown more particularly on the Agreement entitled "Boundary Adjustment Survey for Montgomery County, Situated in Town of Christiansburg, Virginia", dated 19 Aug 2015.

The County Attorney summarized the proposed boundary line adjustment with the Town of Christiansburg. The agreement moves 12.117 acres from the Town limits into the County incorporated area in order to have the entire parcel in the County for the new Animal Care and Adoption Center. The 12.117 acres includes small strips of land along the US 460 Bypass in order to clean up the boundary line. Christiansburg Town Council will hold their public hearing next week.

The County Administrator clarified that no land is being exchanged between the County and the Town. All the property in the boundary adjustment is owned by the County. A portion of the property just happened to be in the Town's corporate limits and the County is requesting that it be moved to the unincorporated area.

There being no speakers, the public hearing was closed.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Tay Taylor addressed the Board in opposition to the proposed proration of personal property taxes in Montgomery County. Mr. Taylor believes the majority of the citizens who live in Montgomery County are not aware that the County is considering proration of personal property taxes. Mr. Taylor asked that any further discussion be deferred until a letter is sent to all County citizens informing them of the County's proposal to prorate personal property tax. Mr. Taylor also expressed concern that the temporary position created to run a trial proration for six months needs to have math and statistical background experience, which he believes the part-time employee does not have. Mr. Taylor believes that the proposed proration is a tax increase for businesses and citizens of the county.

Commissioner of the Revenue - Proration of Personal Property Tax

Helen Royal, Commissioner of the Revenue, provided information about the process of proration of personal property tax. Ms. Royal stated that a citizen will not get personal property tax bill as soon as they purchase a new vehicle or sell a vehicle. The personal property tax bills will be processed in September just like they currently are. The bill will show any changes in the tax year. For example, if a new car is purchased in February the bill would be prorated where the citizen will pay personal property taxes on 11 months instead of a full year. If a car was sold the taxpayer would only pay taxes for the amount of time the vehicle was owned. For example, if the car was traded/sold in February, then the taxpayer would only pay taxes for one month. Supplemental bills will be printed after September for any transactions that occur after the first printing of personal property tax bills. Ms. Royal also stated that the temporary position approved to conduct a trial proration does not need to have a statistical background.

Ms. Royal submitted a chart showing the difference for personal property tax values and levies for non-proration versus test proration as follows:

The Board asked Ms. Royal the number of additional employee she would need in the Commissioner of Revenue's office if proration of personal property tax was implemented. The Treasurer has indicated he would need more than one additional employee.

The Commissioner responded that she would only need the one additional employee; however, she cannot speak for the Treasurer on the number of additional employees.

The Board thanked Ms. Royal for her update on her testing on proration of personal property taxes.

EDA Refunding Opportunity

Courtney Rogers, Montgomery County's Financial Advisor with Davenport & Company, provided information in regards to the County's opportunity to refinance the Economic Development Authority's 2011 Revenue Bond and 2015 Note. Davenport & Company issued a Request for Proposal to local, regional and national lending institutions for the purchase of the EDA Bond up to \$9,750,000. Union Bank and Trust submitted a proposal with two options: Option 1, 2.57% (5 Year Rate/20 Year Amortization), Option 2, 3.5% (10 Year Rate/20 Year Amortization).

Mr. Rogers stated that Davenport & Company recommends the County accept the 2.57% rate fixed for 5 years to refund the County's Series 2011 Bond and Series 2015 Note. This recommendation is based on the following:

- Union's proposal of 2.57% is lower than the existing rates of 3.40% and 3.04%

- The EDA is able to reduce debt service payments, in the first five years, by approximately \$3,900 monthly, or \$46,200 annually. The debt service total savings is \$1,088,067.
- Union’s proposal maintains prepayment flexibility of the outstanding Bond and Note.

The County Administrator recommended moving forward to accept the proposal from Union Bank and Trust.

County Financial Policies

As the County’s Financial Advisory, Davenport & Company, periodically reviews the County’s adopted Financial Policy Guidelines. Due to the changing credit markets, Davenport has advised to make a few revisions to the Financial Policy Guidelines as follows:

- Existing Fund Balance Policy:

“The General Fund reserve target is eight to ten percent of general fund plus school operating fund revenues. For the purpose of determining if the target has been met, the unassigned fund balance of the general fund is compared to the general fund plus school operating fund revenues, excluding the general fund transfer to the school operating fund.”

Davenport Recommendation:

- Davenport recommends the County consider making the upper target of 12% the floor rate and removing the current floor rate of 8% from the Policy.
- Additionally, add language stating that fund balance should only be used for one-time uses and a description on how unassigned fund balance would be replenished if the amount drops below the guideline.
- Add clarifying language to the policy by replacing “General Fund reserve target” with “General Fund unassigned fund balance”.

- Existing Debt Service Policy:

The ratio of debt service expenditures as a percent of governmental fund expenditures should target 10% but not exceed 12%.

Davenport Recommendation:

- Add additional clarifying language defining governmental fund expenditures (i.e. general fund plus school operating fund less the general fund transfer to the school operating fund) and to the policy in general (replace “target” with “strive to be below”).

- Existing Debt vs. Assessed Value Policy:

Net Debt as a percentage of estimated market value of taxable property should target 3% but not exceed 4%.

Davenport Recommendation:

- Add clarifying language to the policy in general (replace “target” with “strive to be below”).

- Example Payout Ratio Policy:

Annually, the County will review the 10 year tax supported debt and lease payout ratio and intends to maintain the ratio at 60% over a five year period, with the ratio being no less than 55% in any one year during the period.

Davenport Recommendation:

- Davenport recommends the County consider adopting a 10-year payout ratio policy.

- Existing Policy on Cash Spent on Capital Projects:

On all general fund supported debt financed projects, the County will attempt to make a down payment of at least 5.00% of total project costs in the aggregate from current resources.”

Davenport Recommendation:

- Davenport recommends a potential amendment/addition to this policy. An example of this language is “The long term goal is to designate a portion of the annual General Fund cash for one time capital projects.”

- Existing Debt Per Capita Policy:

Net debt per capita should remain under \$2,000. Net debt is defined as any and all debt that is tax supported.

Davenport Recommendation:

- Davenport believes the County should consider eliminating this policy.

- Existing Debt vs. Income Policy:

The ratio of net debt per capita as a percentage of personal income should target 7.5% but not exceed 10%.

Davenport Recommendation:

- Davenport believes the County should consider eliminating this policy.

The County Administrator stated that staff will formalize these recommendations and will bring them back to the Board for consideration at their next meeting.

County Refunding Opportunity

Courtney Rogers, Davenport & Company, reported the County has a refunding opportunity to refinance the County’s 2008 Bonds with a potential savings of \$2.78 million due to lowered interest rates. If the Board of Supervisors desires to move forward with the refunding of the 2008 Bonds a resolution to take official action approving the refunding will be before the Board at a meeting in the near future. The closing of the refunding can be as soon as November 2015.

The County Administrator reported the Town of Christiansburg desires to name a section of the town square, where the memorials are located, as the “Veterans Monument Park” to honor those who have died in service. Signage would be as follows:

By consensus, the Board agreed to the placement of the sign. The Board directed the County Administrator to contact the Town of Christiansburg Mayor or Town Manager about cost sharing and who actually owns the property located in the town square.

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S REPORT

The County Attorney reported that several Board members requested he investigate the need for an ordinance to control overgrown grass/weeds and trash on property within the unincorporated areas of the County. A draft ordinance was distributed and a public hearing is scheduled for September 28, 2015. This is in response to the numerous foreclosed properties in the County that are being left in disrepair.

The County Attorney provided an overview of the draft ordinance which states it is illegal to accumulate trash and weeds in excess of twelve (12) inches on any parcel in areas zoned residential, business, commercial or industrial or in areas within the boundaries of platted subdivisions. Any owner or occupant who violates this ordinance shall be subject to a civil penalty of \$50.00 for the first violation. If the owner or occupant fails to clean up the property in the time specified, the County Administrator or designee may direct the County personnel or private contractor to do the work. The cost of cleanup plus administrative fee will constitute a lien against the parcel.

The enforcement of this ordinance will be dealt with on a complaint basis as the County does not have the staff to patrol the entire County.

Several Board members asked why twelve inches was chosen. The County Attorney responded that this is in alignment with neighboring localities ordinances.

COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

The County Administrator reported on the following:

Parks and Recreation Master Plan Survey – The New River Valley Regional Commission continues to assist Montgomery County with its Parks and Recreation (MCPR) Master Plan. A community survey will be administered throughout the county and online. The survey is available through September 30, 2015 on the County website or through this link: <http://bit.ly/mcpr2015>

The plan identifies a unified mission of the Montgomery County Parks and Recreation Department, its recreation assets, and what it needs to do over the next 20 years in response to the County's growing population.

Reception for the outgoing School Superintendent Brenda Blackburn will be held on Tuesday, September 15, 2015 at 5:00 p.m.

The County Administrator will be attending a two day conference at Virginia Tech on Agriculture and Planning on September 21 & 22, 2015.

BOARD MEMBERS REPORTS

Supervisor Tuck reported the Planning Commission continues to review a proposed ordinance for the keeping of residential bees.

Supervisor Biggs attended the Greater Montgomery Liaison Group meeting. They discussed several items of interest including the following:

- Installation of Charging Stations for electronic devices at several restaurants/bars in Blacksburg. This is part of the “Help Save the Next Girl” campaign
- A free concert will be held on VT campus as part of Brad Paisley’s 2015 “Country Nation College Tour”. The tour kicks off on September 6, 2015 at Virginia Tech.

Supervisor Perkins attended the Virginia Tech Montgomery Regional Airport Authority meeting. Several capital projects are ongoing or have been completed, such as the expansion of the runway by 1,000 feet and construction of a new hanger. Supervisor Perkins reported that during the Virginia Tech and Ohio State football game, the Airport had approximately 90-100 planes to land and 362 cars parked at the Airport.

Supervisor Brown reported the new Virginia Tech dairy farm is up and running. He stated that a portion of the milk produced at the dairy farm stays at Virginia Tech while the remainder goes to Fredericksburg.
